The Circle of Remembrance @ GSS Field Trip 1.0: Discovering the Roots of the NS-Dictatorship in Munich, Bavaria and honouring the victims of the Concentration Camp Dachau

Question: Do you know who Max Mannheimer was?

For the very first time at GSS the newly minted extra-curricular club, **The Circle of Remembrance @ GSS**, was offered for 9th graders interested in the Holocaust the connection between Antisemitism, Germany and Europe. The students were curious to explore life in Europe 100 years after the liberation of Germany from the NS-Dictatorship. Questions like...

What are the similarities to today's Germany and the political movements within the EU?

What are the differences? Who are we now and what can we learn from the past?

The Circle of Remembrance @ GSS is a concept developed one of most experienced History teachers in our school, Simone Herzig. Before her days as a teacher she had spent several summers in The Dachau Memorial as an intern, her expertise was of great help. She partnered up with the staff at the Karl Arnold Stiftung (https://karl-arnold-stiftung.de/) and developed this program (The program seminar can be viewed at the end of this report)
We had a wonderful guide, Benedict Müschenborn from the Karl Arnold Stiftung. He was very knowledgable, accommodating and fun to be around.

In early 2024 a field trip was planned for the Münich area with stops at Dachau (https://www.kz-gedenkstaette-dachau.de/en/), The Max Mannheimer Foundation (https://mmsz-dachau.de/studienzentrum/), The LMU University (The White Rose Resistance Group) https://www.weisse-rose-stiftung.de/white-rose-foundation/ a NS-Documentation Museum https://www.weisse-rose-stiftung.de/white-rose-foundation/ and a NS-Documentation https://www.weisse-rose-stiftung.de/white-rose-foundation/ and a NS-Documentation <a href="https://www.weisse-rose-stiftung.de/white-rose-stiftun

www.nsdoku.de/en/. This documentation center is new and highlights the connection between Munich, the National Socialistic Party and the rise of Adolf Hitler dictatorship. Fun Fact: The Israeli Embassy is located right next door, quite symbolic.

Participants included 25 students (14 boys and 11 girls) between the age of 15-16 that took part in this 5-day seminar. Ms Madden (formerly Tenge-Rietberg), the Erasmus+ Coordinator and member of the History Department at GSS, joined in to escort as and brought in some Erasmus+ expertise. Along with the journey was the DiGI Box from a former Erasmus+ project Be A.C.T.I.V.E, Be Happy! (KA229-C0D5DD75). This concept was developed in Sweden for our digital detox project from 2020-2023. It is a box in which we collect cell phones before we start lessons, The students get the cell phones in return at the end of the lesson, museum our, etc. There are no cell phones allowed at meal times. At that time it is important to discuss the events of the day

The DiGi box was brought to each of the seminars in order to decrease the focus on cell phone and social media activities. In the end, guides and students both commented on how useful this tool is in order to increase collaboration and concentration.

Our current Erasmus+ project, KA120-NW-22108925, H.E.R.0. (Help Everyone, Reach Out) was also highlighted as the goal is to increase service learning, civil courage, volunteering and standing up for what you believe in (Democratic and European Values). The name of our school is, indeed, The Geschwister-Scholl Realschule, Gütersloh, NWR and visiting the memorial located in the Ludwig-Maximilian University in Munich was especially important and meaningful. It became quite clear to the participants who the members of White Rose Resistance Group were and what they risked and undertook for freedom. They did not die in vain, they are role models and heroes for us today. They encouraged their fellow students to stand -up and fight for a change in politics and policy under the dictator, Adolf Hitler and save the fate of Germany.

Another interesting aspect of **The Circle of Remembrance** is the fact that several of our members have migration backgrounds and have no personal connection to the history of Germany in WWII, however realise that current events in Germany and Europe are concerning and democracy and history have a connection. Students of German heritage were able to answer some of the most compelling questions that have plagued them, "How could this happen?". No matter what the personal motive, the students were trained and sensitised to the importance of reading the news and staying informed of what is going on around them, especially days before the EU election, where some students are qualified to vote.

The core message: **NEVER AGAIN!**

In a free democracy one must be aware in order to effectively watch and defend human rights. This visit was an exceptional opportunity for our students to honour the dead and to pay tribute to the many heroes that risked their lives for freedom and civil courage.

In June 2024, Europe and the US celebrate the 80th anniversary of D-Day and the beginning of the end of WWII, the Liberation of Europe. One that operation alone an estimated 10,000.00 soldiers dies (Allied Forces and Germans combined).

Next year, in 2025, the 80th Anniversary of the Liberation of Europe and the beginning of its journey into a free world respectful of human rights and the rule of law.

We are looking forward to teaming up Erasmus+ on a few new projects to deepen our mission with our European neighbours and friends.
